# History of the School

## A SHORT HISTORY OF JAMAICA COLLEGE

When was Jamaica College founded? Was it 1795 when a small school opened its doors in the parish of St. Ann or was it the early part of the last century when the name changed to Jamaica Free School? This remained its name when the school moved to the Barbican Court House in St. Andrew. Was the school founded when it moved to its present site at Hope and St. Andrew in 1885 and was renamed Jamaica High School, or was it founded in 1903 when the school was renamed for the fourth time, this time Jamaica College. These questions are necessary because at least four dates have been given for the founding of the school. Like many others, I prefer the earliest date. An institution, like a person, is as old as its existence, not its name.

So the name of the school changed four times, but practically speaking so did the purpose of the school. The changes in purpose do not necessarily synchronize with the changes in name, but nonetheless there is a similarity in the number four here. In the first instance, the school was founded out of funds left in the will of Charles Drax for the education of poor children. By "poor children" was meant "poor WHITE children". At the time Blacks who were in slavery at the time were not legally regarded as people. This was its first purpose, and the name "Drax Free School" and later "Jamaica Free School" had nothing to do with the concept of free people but meant that the school was for the children of free people not slaves.

Incidentally, the location of the school also changed four times. When it moved to its fourth and final location it also got its new name, the Jamaica High School. This was in 1885, and the buildings were opened by the Governor of Jamaica on the ninth of July in that Year. All were free so there was no longer a need to call the school "Jamaica Free School" but the purpose of the school remained the same until 1903. The site at the time was also the tropical outpost of the University of London. It was therefore decided that the purpose of the school would be to give a secondary preparation to potential students of the University of London who happened to reside in Jamaica. The name change reflected this change of purpose and in a sense the old school died then and there. This was its second purpose.



# History of the School



Although the sole purpose of Jamaica College from 1903 onwards was to train potential university students in Jamaica when the University of the West Indies did not exist, in practice most students did not go further than certificate level. That was considered sufficient education for just about any managerial or clerical job in Jamaica. It was also considered uneconomical to run a school of less than eighty boys, and therefore a deliberate attempt to expand the school to include those of parents who were able to afford the fees was never made. By the nineteen thirties, the student population rose to over one hundred and fifty. This wider education became a third, if additional purpose to the one set in 1903.

In 1957, the elected government of the day introduced a system of Common Entrance to all High Schools. After some amount of initial resistance by the school board, Jamaica College, previously accessible to the elite and those few boys who won government scholarships, was opened up to the masses of Jamaica. Without it being made so, the fourth purpose of the college evolved. No longer was it a school for the express purpose of training university students, but its purpose was to provide one of several outlets for secondary education in Jamaica. One of the present problems of the school is that ever since the introduction of the Common Entrance, it has not been able to decide whether it simply wants to be just another high school, or if it wishes to aim for something different alternative to what is offered in other schools. If some have wished for the latter, they have not defined the type of alternative.

There are no accessible records of the Principals when the school was located in St. Ann. Since its location at St. Andrew, its Principals have been Archdeacon William Simms (an Englishman; 1885-1915), Mr. William Green (an Englishman; 1916-1933), Mr. Reginald Murray (a Jamaican and J.C. old Boy; 1934-1941), Mr. John Huddle (an Englishman, son of the Anglican Bishop; 1941-1946), Mr. Hugo C. Chambers (a Jamaican and J.C. old Boy; 1946-1960) Mr. V. H. Ennevor (a Jamaican and J.C. old Boy; 1960-1964), Mr. W. H. Williams (a Welshman; 1965-1970) and its current Principal Mr. Ruel Taylor (a Jamaican and Cornwall J.C. old Boy; Acting Principal 1970 and Principal 1971 to date).





## Will of Late Charles Drax of Twittenham, England

Libro of Wills 16 Folio 15.- dated 7th July, 1721, Executors - William Parrott of London, Merchant & Capt. Robert Toublay: In the name of God Amen. I recommend my soul to God. WILL of LATE CHARLES DRAX OF TWITTENHAM, ENGLAND

Libro of Wills 16 Folio 15.- dated 7th July, 1721, Executors - William Parrott of London, Merchant & Capt. Robert Toublay:

**I**n the name of God Amen. I recommend my soul to God. It is my desire that I be buried at the Church of St. Mary's. I will, order and direct, that the new House which I erected and built on my land in Jamaica, called Shelton, shall from and immediately after my decease be applyed, appropriated and used as a free school or hospital for ever for the support, maintenance and education of eight poor boys and four poor girls belonging to the inhabitants of St. Ann in the island aforesaid and my will is, that they be all taught reading, writing and arithmetick and for that purpose some sober learned and discreet man be nominated and appointed by me Exrs., and the survivors of them in Jamaica so long as they or either of them shall live and by, the majority of the Justices of the said Parish after their decease to whom there shall be yearly paid by four equal quarterly payments £40 current money of Jamaica, for his pains and trouble and also have the full use, and benefit of the said free school or hospital during his continuance of a master thereof - it being my intention that such person and all others appointed for the management said service of the said free school or hospital shall be liable to be turned out by the majority of the said Justices as often as they may see fit. I will also that a sober careful woman be appointed to look after and nurse the said poor boys and girls and to teach the girls to sew and to do plain work and other housewifely things and that there be yearly paid to her by quarterly payments £20 per annum current money of Jamaica. I will that there be a Good cherurgeon or apothecary appointed to from time to time visit and administer physics or other helps and assistance and for his care in that affair there be yearly paid to him by half yearly payments the sum or £13 current money of Jamaica at Michaelmas and lady day.

I order that two of my negro women slaves as shall be thought most capable shall from time to time be taken off my plantation in the island aforesaid and kept constantly employed in the said free school or hospital to keep the said hospital, clean and neat and to dress the victuals and otherwise attend on the said boys and girls.

I will that each boy shall upon his admission be supplied with 6 shirts, 4 warm waistcoats, 4 pairs breeches, 6 pairs hose, 4 pair shoes and 2 hats and each boy shall be yearly during his continuance there be provided with the like quantity of clothes and each girl shall be provided for in proportion with the boys. No girl or boy shall be admitted to the school or hospital until he or she shall be

...and each boy attaining the age of 15 years shall be placed out to such manual trade by my Exrs. ...the majority of the Justices aforesaid shall think proper and every boy that faithfully serves out his ...shall be paid at the end of his term £5 of current money of Jamaica to buy him tools, and each ...placed out as aforesaid apprentice upon attaining the age of 14 years, and my will and mind is that ...Stephew of the Parish of St. Mary hath any child fit to be admitted and provided for in the manner ...that such child or children be admitted and that Catherine the daughter of John Lush Esq. deceased ...admitted and given £51 at 21. I give Catherine Lush a negro woman slave named Bisstole ...possession of her mother. I will that Joseph Gibbs a poor boy born and bred in my family, be ...the said free school. My will and mind is that my slave Robinson be admitted into the free School ...and be brought up and placed out as one of them. All boys and girls admitted to the said free ...hospital shall be instructed in the principles and the doctrines of the Church of England and that the ...be constantly supplied on every vacancy. They shall be supplied with good bedding and sheets ...one bed and that they eat fresh meat every Sunday and Thursday with good bread and ...and every Friday with fresh fish if to be had; if not with saltfish on Monday, beef and pudding ...and peas and on Saturday with what can be most easily procured. I make my estate at ...and chargeable for ever with the several payments expenses and disbursements to be made or ...about the said free school or hospital and desire it may be supported and kept up decently and ...and that the house now appointed for it may be enlarged if necessary at any time. If at any time ...a deficiency I make my other estates in Jamaica subject to make good such deficiency. I will ...to build a Church where the old Church stood which was built by Peter Martyr Bishop of ...£200 to be kept back till the work is complete.... Here follows several bequests of money (e.g. ...£20 a year, Susanna £20 a year, Elizabeth Ekin £10, Dorothy Willdon £40) and several slaves ...To Sarah Murphew £10 per annum during her life and permitted to live at Rio Nova in the Parish

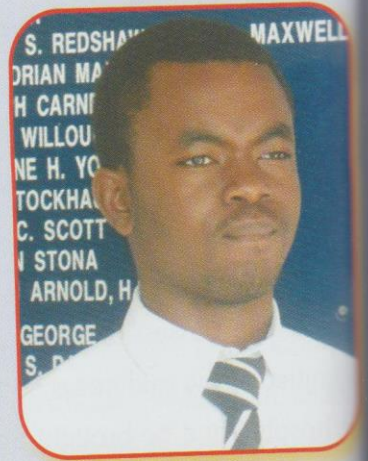




# Editor's Message

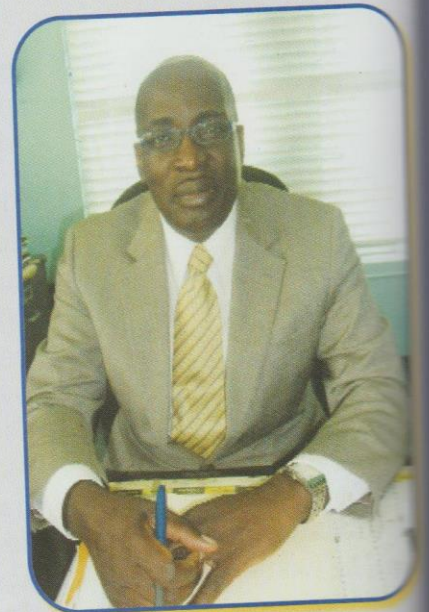


# Principal's Message & School Report

I greet you all in our 5th year of our initial 5 year plan. In September 2006, we assumed the mantle of leadership of Jamaica College with a student population moving from below 1400 to 1757 students.

A number of things have had significant improvement:

1. Discipline and order on the School Campus
2. Accountability at all levels
3. Improved the quality and reach of all student services.
4. Improved the academic performance of the students
5. A more caring and nurturing environment for our students.
6. Improved our school facilities, construction of new auditorium and entrance gate.



There is no Jamaica college student who cannot get any kind of assistance that is genuinely needed.

Our Guidance and Counselling Department as well as our Health and welfare Department provided many services to our student population. About one hundred needy students received lunch everyday resulting in the school providing approximately 20, 000 lunches in the school year.

The Health Department provided services to between twenty to forty students each day or approximately 8000 cases over the school year. Dental Services were provided twice weekly and approximately eight to ten patients are seen daily or approximately 800 over the school year.

### **The Schools Extra Curricular & Co curricular activities**

More students participated in these activities than did previously. Most Clubs and Societies are vibrant. The cadet Unit saw increased registrations resulting in the unit copping several prizes.

### **Special Events and Cultural Awareness Programmes**

There were a number of special events which formed part of the school's calendar, the Annual Gospel Crusade, a week long programme for all JC students which has been a resounding success, the ISCF Week, Jamaica Day, Teacher's Day, recognizing the performance of teachers and the announcement of a Teacher of the Year Award.

School Challenge Quiz team went to the quarter finals for the first time in 15 years in 2010 and did it again in 2011.

In sports, the young men of Jamaica College performed with excellence which resulted in major prizes coming to Jamaica College over the period. Our Hockey teams and basketball teams continued to do well.

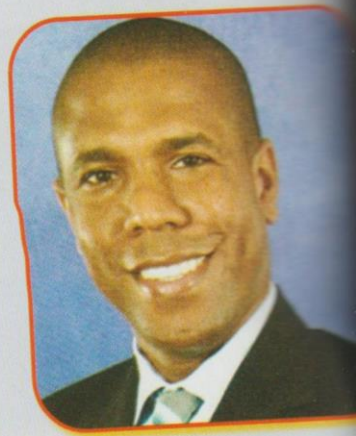

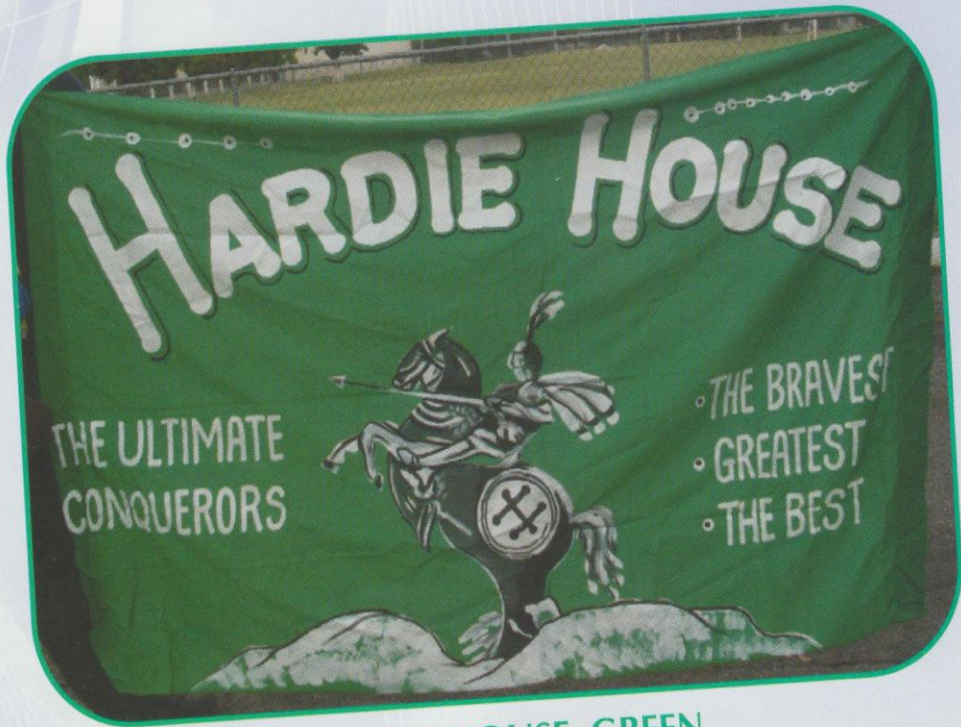
## DRAX HOUSE: MAROON

This house is named after the founding father of Jamaica College, Charles Drax, an estate owner from Twittenham, England, who came to Jamaica from Barbados and contributed towards the establishment of the school. The house is identified by maroon.

## HARDIE HOUSE: GREEN

Hardie house is quite "hardy" on Sports Day, as members consider themselves invincible. The house is named after the fourth principal at Hope Road, Mr. W. A. Hardie. He served as principal from 1942 – 1945. The house sports green.

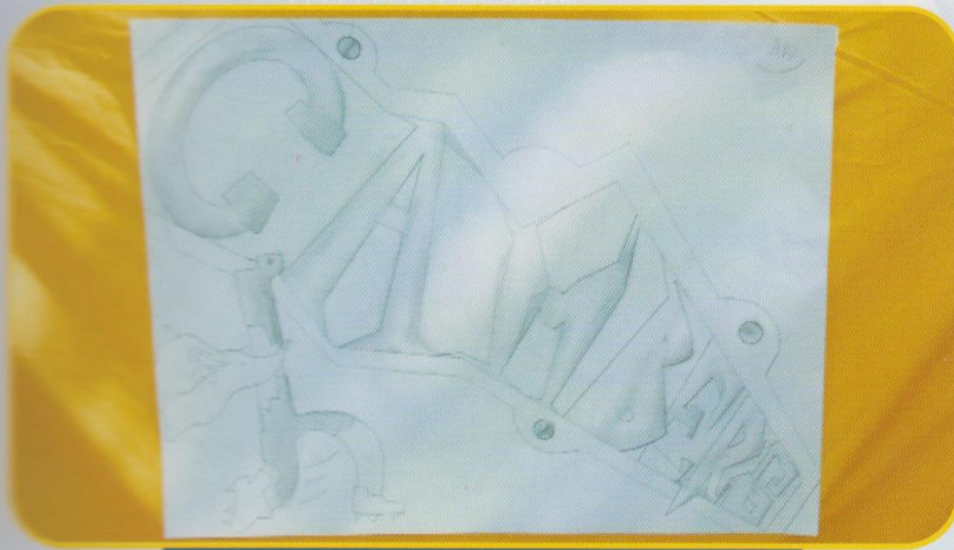


## MURRAY HOUSE: BLUE

Murray House is named in honour of Reginald Myrie Murray, third Principal of Jamaica College, since it has been at its present location. Mr. Murray served for 8 years from 1933 – 1941. This house is represented by a griffin and its colour is blue.

## CHAMBERS HOUSE: YELLOW

This house is named after the fifth principal and first Old Boy who was principal at the Hope location. MR. Hugo Carl Winston Chambers served for 14 years from 1946 – 1960, and the annual track event was named in his honour: this house sports yellow.



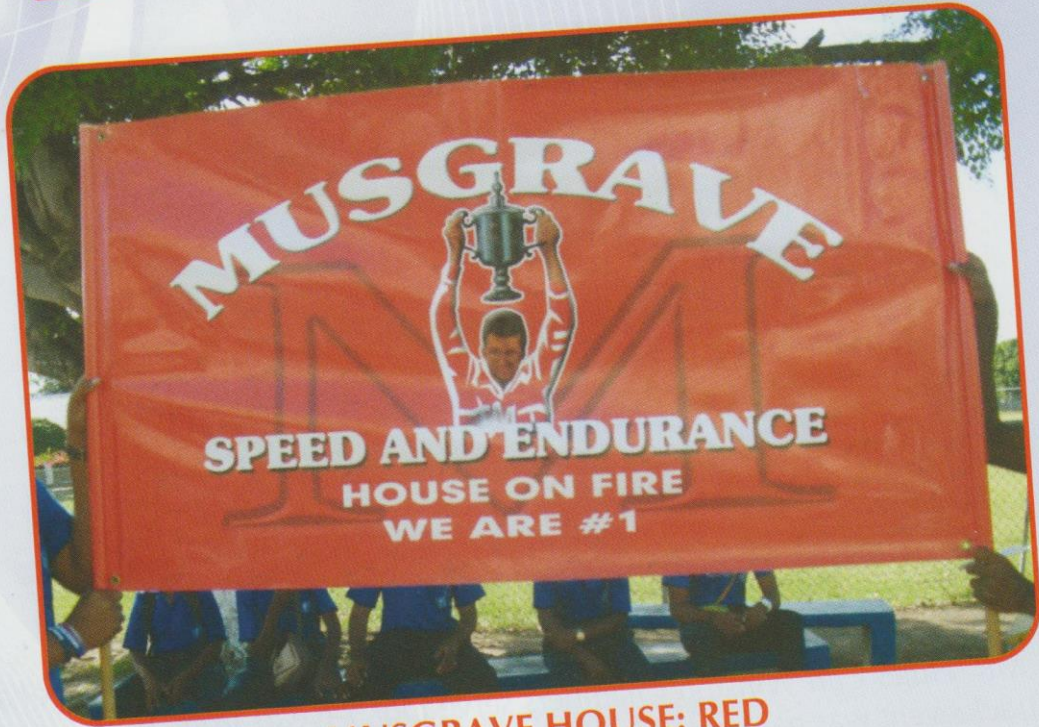
## COWPER HOUSE: PURPLE

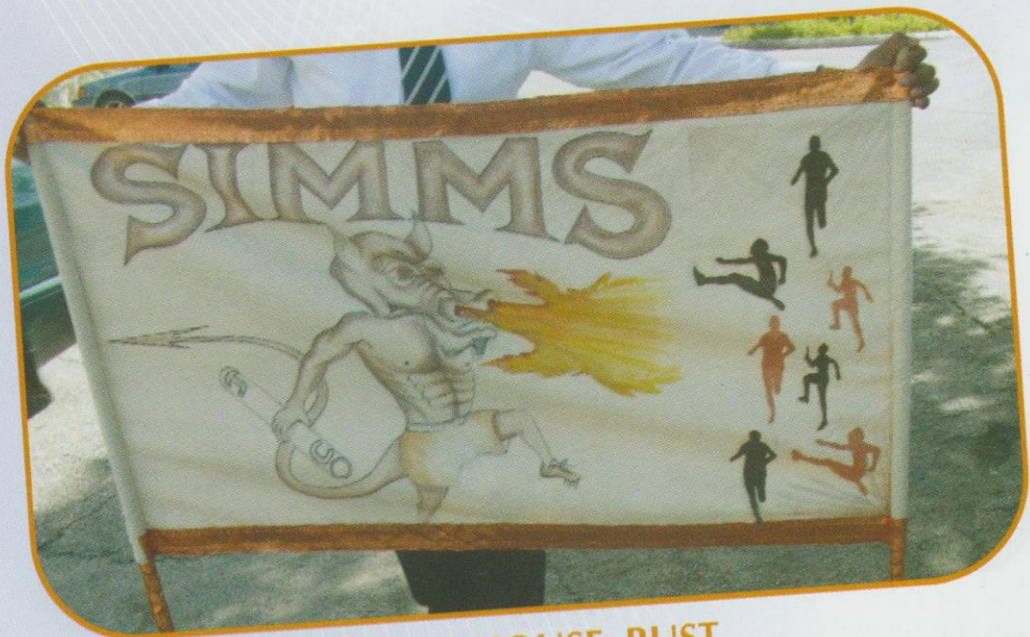

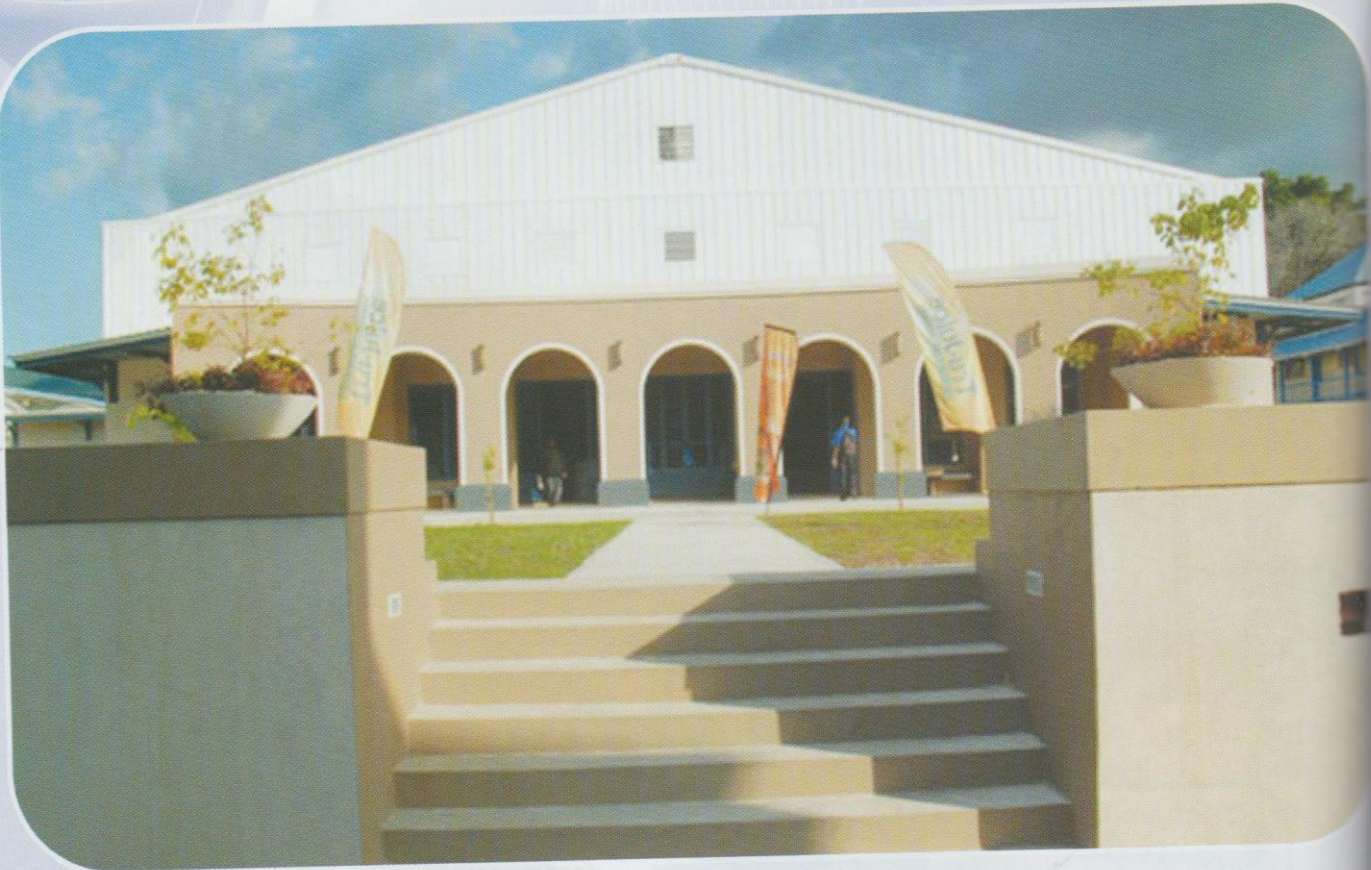

# *Karl Hendrickson Auditorium*

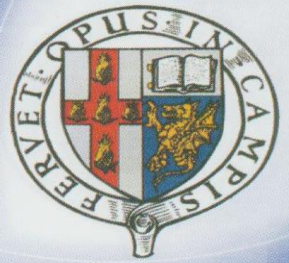

# Digicel Laboratories

Jamaica College, has received two fully-refurbished and upgraded Chemistry and Physics Labs from the Digicel Foundation. # NEW GATE

Jamaica College Main Entrance gate 'new look' is now a reality!! This reality happened as a result of 'old boys' who attended the school in the 1950s and 60s who decided to raise funds from other 'old boys' to fund a new entrance gate project. Total cost of the project was \$8M.

The project was mainly for:

1. To enhance the image of the school which over the last three (3) years have spent over \$1M on needed building repairs and other physical improvements as well as on educational upgrade (computer labs (in a population of 1700, there is currently 1:8 ratio re:computer: students).

2. To provide an entrance to accommodate 2-way vehicular traffic.

3. To provide a much needed walkway for students, teachers & visitors.



The project was initiated in November of 2009, and was completed in May 2010. Many Jamaica College 'old boys' have made generous contributions of cash, time, equipment, and labour in making this project a reality.

We are sure that 'old boys' who would welcome the opportunity to contribute to this worthy cause, as there is still much work to be done in progress on the grounds around the main gate. Jamaica College (JC) made history in this year's Inter-Secondary School Sports Association (ISSA) football competition. After pushing the boundaries of success JC has earned the right to be crowned 'Triple Champion'. The 'Boys in Blue' were selfish in taking all three trophies this season – Manning Cup, Walker Cup and the 'most wanted' Olivier Shield. In all finals JC was victorious, registering a 3-0 win over Waterford (Manning Cup), a 3-1 win over Bridgeport (Walker Cup) and a 1-0 aggregate win over Rusea's High (Olivier Shield). This remarkable achievement empowered by the determination of the boys and the drive of leadership by head coach Alfred Henry has cemented a new historic triple win.

The Manning Cup saw JC's consistent strength in the first going into the second round of the competition. The 'Dark Blues' utilized the mistakes of their competitors while spraying accurate passes and firing accurately continuously. With JC hinting to be a second half team, spectators have seen many come backs to secure a win before the final whistle.

When the two teams entered Constant Spring Playing Field for match number one, they were greeted with a warm atmosphere of encouragement. It was JC nevertheless who made the first goal in the shape of a penalty kick. The second half was more adventurous with shots hitting hard at both goals. Rusea's raided JC's defensive wall and successfully claimed a penalty kick in the 63rd minute. However, Jason Brown failed to meet his target and kicked the ball high over the cross bar.

The second leg at Jamet Park was lit up with high expectations. It was the second and final leg of the Olivier Shield. Rusea's Ramon Foster and JC's Nicholas Scott opened early attacks but Foster was the only one to score. Jamaica College gradually took control of the midfield and had great chances to score through Ashani Walker and Nicholas Scott. In the latter part of the game Rusea's Jermaine Brown missed his golden opportunity, kicking his ball wide of goal. Although the game ended 0-0, JC's defensive performance was a testament to their objective of avoiding defeat, which was just enough to lift the 'Shield'.

It has been a great one for Jamaica College, filled with countless memories of joy. The 'Urban Area Double' had completed the season triple for the first time in school boy football. Jamaica College has lifted the bar of success. Come next year, JC will be back to reclaim hold of the Manning Cup trophy at 189 Old Hope Road.





# School Hockey Report 2011



After winning the Excelsior School's Indoor Hockey Tournament for the third consecutive year, last seasons runners up Jamaica College went on to win the ISSA/JHF school outdoor Hockey Tournament without conceding a single goal.

The Indoor Tournament with a 6-1 triumph over last year runners up Wolmers Boys, then erasing Champion College 9 - 0 to gain an early semi-final birth. The team's dominance continued in the semi-final with a 4 - 0 whipping of Mona High. Jamaica College then moved on to play Wolmers Boys again in the finals. 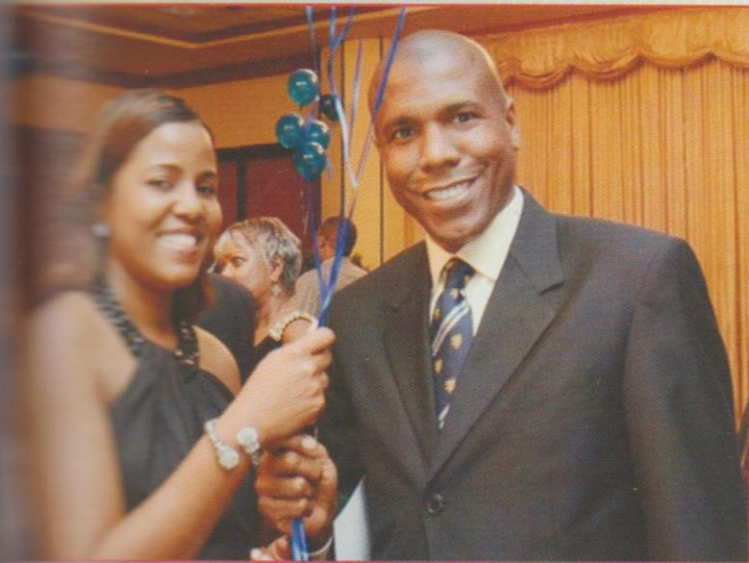

The ceremony concluded with the surprise celebration of Mr. Phillip Gore's birthday.

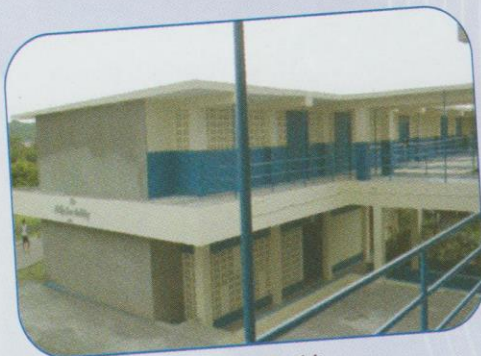

Michael-Shane Brown now to be studying Business and Computer Science at a University, preferably at the University of Toronto or Harvard University.

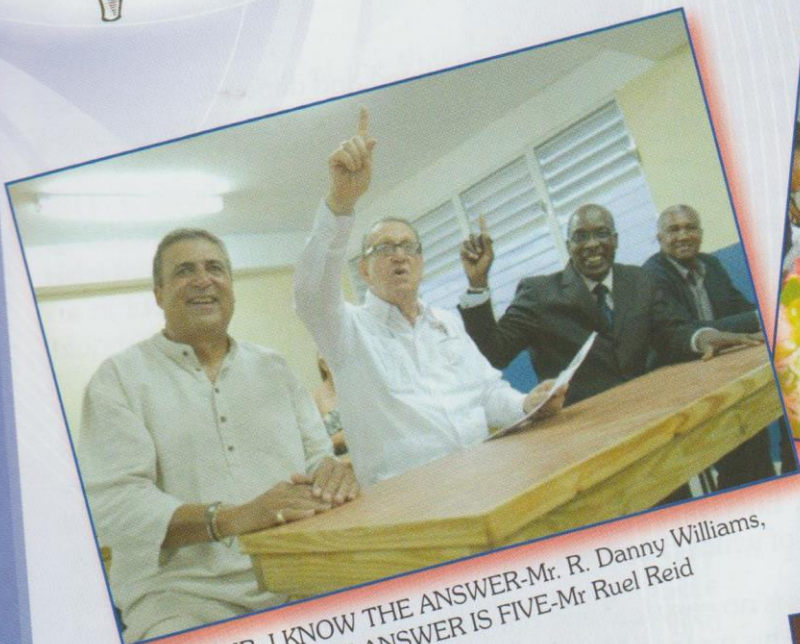
