Board Chairman's Message



t is a pleasure for me, on behalf of the members of the School Board, to submit a message for inclusion in the Griffin 2007.

The past school year 2006/2007 has been a most challenging but extremely rewarding one for our school. It was in January 2006 that a new Board was convened following the reestablishment of the school as a Trust School. We must thank the previous Board for having achieved this important objective. Now that we are a Trust school, from here on, we will recommend to the Ministry of Education the seven key members of the Board including the Chairman and Vice Chairman.

mmediately on appointment the new board set about the job of transforming our school and once again putting it on the path to regaining its position as the #1 school in the country.

The school year commenced with the appointment of a new principal, Mr. Ruel Reid and later in the year a new Vice Principal, Mr. Rohan Wong. The other Vice Principal, Mrs. Collette Fertardo-Pryce had already been appointed in January 2006.

The new Board working along with the School's Management and the Trust as well as the new lamaica College Foundation funded by Jamaica College old boys and the Old Boys Association set out to improve all aspects of school operations. Focus was placed on academics, student discipline, staff development, infrastructure and administration.

We also wished to achieve technology upgrades.

The school's curriculum was reviewed and revised. Numeracy and literacy programmes were undertaken among several year groups and these assessments will continue.

Significant gains were also made in the area of student discipline and several staff development workshops were undertaken. All these measures are geared towards enhancing the academic performance of our students.

Improvements in the day by day operations of the school included the computerization of the administrative and accounting systems and the maximizing of earnings from the lease of school facilities. where appropriate.

Significant upgrades in the physical facilities were undertaken. These included but were not limited to repairs of windows and doors, replacing roofs in the Simms Building and the St. Dunstan Chapel, as well as proofing all slab roofs, refurbishing our staff cottages, paving areas of the grounds and building security fencing.

In addition to dealing with the physical plant and improving the administration in the school, we have made it possible for the School Administration to introduce incentives to teachers.

As we look to the future we will continue to do everything in our power to provide our students and teachers with excellent physical facilities and a good learning environment supported by all the modern equipment required for effectiveness in the new world.

Above all we recognise that our task is to prepare our students for the world outside so that they can make a meaningful contribution to their own self development, and in time become well rounded leaders of our society. We accept this responsibility and will do everything in our power to achieve it.


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ADDRESS FROM

THE NATIONAL SECONDARY STUDENTS' COUNCIL OF JAMAICA



The nation recognized the efforts of the youth and affirmed the stance taken by this institution and in 1980 made it a mandatory part of all secondary public high schools. The Education Act of 1980 assures students that their rights will be well managed. Each school must have a students' council and this body's main aim is to advocate on student affairs; ensuring a level representation for students which in previous years was grossly absent. The Education System strove to equity through legislation and thus the council represents students on issues ranging from detention to expulsion.

The National Secondary Students' Council of Jamaica is essentially a coalition of all the island's local councils; each council serves as a member state and hence binds the NSSC by collective decisions made during the sittings of the General Assembly as outlined by the directives of the National Constitution.

THE NATIONAL STUDENTS' COUNCIL

The National Students' Council has four tiers, the local council, the regional council, the national council and the national executive council. The regional council is comprised of the local councils in a set geographic area. Jamaica College is situated in the largest region, Region I (Kingston & St.

Andrew). Largest, not in terms of size but largest in scope, that is, the amount of councils situated in this region, forty-four to be exact. The National Council is comprised of all six regions across the island and the National Executive is convened the National Officers (National · President. General Secretary, National Public Relations Officer, National Treasurer) and the Six Regional Vice Presidents meet.

We do hope that in years to come JC will continue to participate in the endeavors of the National Council.



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

Yes, I am a part of the Jamaica College Performing Ensemble and so far I'm the only dancer on the team.


9. Are you involved in any other activates apart from dancing?

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


He studies after training and on Sundays. Unlike his classmates he does not have the "fortune" to miss classes or not pay






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RECANTING THE LEGENDS AND TRADITIONS OF

JAMAICA COLLEGE







he Magazine Committee's faculty advisor, Miss Marguerite Anderson had the honour of sharing with her uncle, Mr. George McIntosh an accountant who is an old boy of Jamaica College. This is the story he recounts of his years 1966-1972.

Here are some memories of JC during my time in the 60's:

Holy ground- this was an area situated to the left of the cricket score board facing the main entrance to the Administration building. No one ever walked on this plot of ground. It was in memory of JC alumni who died in the two World Wars. There is a plaque in the chapel with the names. I believe it was automatic detention if you were caught walking across Holy Ground. Then there was the Sunday tradition. The boarders at JC had to attend early morning service every Sunday! This was in the chapel. After the chapel became inadequate due to space constraints, this was switched to the Assembly Hall, where every student gathered each morning for prayer. No one missed prayer at Assembly; it was a cardinal sin that no one dared to commit.


Prefects and monitors handed out detention and it was legal. You had to respect the prefects and monitors. You never went into the **6th form room** if you were a junior boy. That was trouble. There was a disciplinarian who went by the moniker '**Mighty Mouse**'. Many of us back then thought he would have been the next Headmaster. He was so strict, so correct, and so pervasive. "No retrospective glance at my years at JC would be complete without mentioning

that the new student must prove he has a head (brain) to endure all adversity and candle-greasing determining the weak from the strong". For this initiation process, a lit candle was held over the student's head and the hot wax was allowed to drip on his head. As for the "not too horrible singing", every new boy had to pick a song on the hit parade and sing it to the satisfaction of the seniors who listened. Every new student wanted to get to 2nd form to exact some measure of revenge on the next batch of new students. Your **badge** was worn with pride and it was not fashionable to be dirty in your person and certainly not in the blue. Shirt out of pants and uniform unkempt were simply unheard of, not to mention any other breaches of the dress code!

No memory of JC can ever be complete without mentioning the Late Great Jimmy Carnegie. He was a walking talking, sitting encyclopedia, a giant who bestrode every subject with serene humility. He was a disciplined friend, teacher, educator, historian, communicator, sports personality, who ensured his offerings were always spot on. He was a mentor and he knew the value of a practical lesson and the lasting effect of a good example. If you were a teacher

who erred, he would correct you, if you were a student who was straying, he would guide you and he could be approached on any subject, not just history which he taught with distinction.

THE WILL OF CHARLES DRAX



WILL OF LATE CHARLES DRAX OF TWITTENHAM, ENGLAND

Libro of Wills 16 Folio 15. - dated 7th July, 1721, Executors - William Parrott of London, Merchant & Capt. Robert Toublay:

n the name of God Amen. I recommend my soul to God. It is my desire that I be buryed at the Church of St. Mary's. I will, order and direct, that the new House which I erected and built on my land in Jamaica, called Shelton, shall from and immediately after my decease be applyed, appropriated and used as a free school or hospital for ever for the support, maintenance and education of eight poor boys and four poor girls belonging to the inhabitants of St. Ann in the island aforesaid and my will is, that they be all taught reading, writing and arithmetick and for that purpose some sober learned and discreet man be nominated and appointed by my Exrs., and the survivors of them in Jamaica so long as they or either of them shall live and by, the majority of the Justices of the said Parish after their decease to whom there shall be yearly paid by four equal quarterly payments £40 current money of Jamaica, for his pains and

trouble and also have the full use, and benefit of the said free school or hospital during his continuance of a master thereof - it being my intention that such person and all others appointed for the management said service of the said free school or hospital shall be liable to be turned out by the majority of the said Justices as often as they may see fit. I will also that a sober careful woman be appointed to look after and nurse the said poor boys and girls and to teach the girls to say and to do plain work and other housewifely things and that there be yearly paid to her by quarterly payments £20 per annum current money of Jamaica. I will that there be a Good cherurgeon or apothecary appointed to from time to time visit and administer physics or other helps and assistance and for his care in that affair there be yearly paid to him by half yearly payments the sum or £13 current money of Jamaica at Michaelmas and lady day.

I order that two of my negro women slaves as shall be thought most capable shall from time to time be taken off my plantation in the island aforesaid and kept constantly employed in the said free school or hospital to keep the said hospital, clean and neat and to dress the victuals and otherwise attend on the said boys and girls.

I will that each boy shall upon his admission be supplied with 6 shirts, 4 warm waistcoats, 4 pairs breeches, 6 pairs hose, 4 pair shoes and 2 hats and each boy shall be yearly during his continuance there be provided with the like quantity of clothes and each girl shall he provided for in proportion with the boys. No girl or boy shall be admitted to the school or hospital until he or she shall be 6 years old and each boy attaining the age of 15 years shall be placed out to such manual trade by my Exrs. or the majority of the Justices aforesaid shall think proper and every boy that faithfully serves out his apprenticeship shall be paid at the end of his term £5 of current money of Jamaica to buy him tools, and each girl shall he placed out as aforesaid apprentice upon attaining ' the age of 14 years, and my will and mind is that if Sarah Murphew of the Parish of St. Mary hath any child fit to be admitted and provided for in the manner aforesaid that such child or children be admitted and that Catherine the daughter of John Lush Esq. deceased be immediately admitted and given £51 at 21. I give Catherine Lush a negro woman slave named Bisstole which is in possession of her mother. I will that Joseph Gibbs a poor boy born and bred in my family, be admitted to the said free school. My will and mind is that my slave Robinson be admitted into the free School or hospital and be brought up and placed out as one of them. All boys and girls admitted to the said free school or hospital stall be instructed in the principles and the doctrines of the Church of England and that the boys and girls be constantly supplied on every vacancy. They shall be supplied with good bedding and sheets two to lye on one bed and that they eat fresh meat every Sunday and Thursday with good bread and wholesome liquor and every Friday with

fresh fish if to be had; if not with saltfish on Monday, beef and pudding on Tues days, pork and peas and on Saturday with what can can be most easily procured. I make my estate at Shelton liable and chargeable for ever with the severa payments expenses and disbursement to be made or laid out in or about the said free school or hospital and desire may be supported and kept up decently and in good order and that the house now appointed for it may be enlarged i necessary at any time. If at any time there shall prove a deficiency I make m other estates in Jamaica subject to make good such deficiency. I will that £500 be given to build a Church where the old Church stood which was built by Peter Martyr Bishop of the West Indies £200 to be kept back till the work i complete.... Here follows several be quests of money (e.g. Frances Palme £20 a year, Susanna £20 a year, Eliza beth Ekin £10, Dorothy Willdon £40 and several slaves made free. To Sarah Murphew £10 per annum during her life and permitted to live at Rio Nova in the Parish of St. Mary.

A SHORT HISTORY OF JAMAICA COLLEGE

then was Jamaica College founded? Was it 1795 when a small school opened its door in the parish of St. Ann or was it the early part of the last century when the name changed to Jamaica Free School? This remained its name when the school moved to the Barbican Great House in St. Andrew. Was the school founded when it moved to its present site at Hope

in St. Andrew in 1885 and was renamed Jamaica High School, or was it founded in 1903 when the school was renamed for the fourth time, this time Jamaica College. These questions are necessary because at least four dates have been given for the founding of the school. Like many others, I prefer the earliest date. An institution, like a person, is as old as its existence, not its name.

Co the name of the school changed four Itimes, but practically speaking so did the purpose of the school. The changes in purpose do not necessarily synchronize with the changes in name, but nonetheless there is a similarity in the number four here. In the first instance, the school was founded out of funds left in the will of Charles Drax for the education of poor children. By "poor children" was meant "poor WHITE children", as the Blacks who were in slavery at the time were not legally regarded as people. This was its first purpose, and the name "Drax Free School" and later "Jamaica Free School" had nothing to do with the concept of free tuition, but meant that the school was for the children of free people not slaves.

Incidentally, the location of the school also changed four times. When it moved to its fourth and final location It also got its new name, the Jamaica High School. This was in 1885, and the buildings were opened by the Governor of Jamaica on the ninth of July in that Year. All were free so there was no longer a need to call the school "Jamaica Free School" but the purpose of the school remained the same until 1903. The site at Hope was also the tropical outpost of the University of London. It was therefore decided that the purpose of the school would be to give a secondary preparation to potential students of the University of London who happened to reside in Jamaica. The name change reflected this change of purpose and in a sense the old school died then and there. This was its second purpose.

Although the sole purpose of Jamaica College from 1903 onwards was to train potential university students in the days when the University of the West Indies did not exist, in practice most students did not go further than fourth or fifth forms. That was consid-

ered sufficient education for just about any managerial or clerical job in Jamaica. It was also considered uneconomical to run a school of less than eighty boys, and therefore a deliberate attempt to expand the school to include those of parents who were able to afford the fees was embarked upon. By the nineteen thirties, the student population rose to over one hundred and fifty. This wider education became a third, if additional purpose to the one set in 1903.

In 1957, the elected government of the day introduced a system of Common Entrance to all High Schools. After some amount of initial resistance by the school board, Jamaica College, previously accessible to the elite and a few bright boys who won government scholarships, was opened up to the masses of Jamaica. Without it being formally said, the fourth purpose of the college evolved. No longer was it a school for the express purpose of training university students, but its purpose was to provide one of several outlets for secondary education in Jamaica. One of the present problems of the school is that ever since the introduction of the Common Entrance, it has not been able to decide whether it simple wants to be just another high school, or if it wishes to aim for a special and different alternative to what is offered in other schools. If some have wished for the latter, they have not defined the type of alternative.

Despite the Changes in purpose and emphasis of the School from Simms to Taylor, Jamaica College continues to provide a liberal education where the students are taught to think for themselves and to create their own opinions and ideas. Cultural values have changed in Jamaica and this is reflected in every School, including Jamaica Collage. In my own experience, I have found that

charges of breakdown in the discipline of the School are largely unfounded. As an Old Boy of J.C. who voluntarily helps the guidance department, which did not exist in the time of most of the old boys reading this short history, I find that the youngsters are no different from the days when I attended the school in the sixties.

The current attempts to revive the "old hash and roast beef" cheer is not without historical irony. When it was created in the days of the stern Principal, the Englishman William Cowper, it was frowned upon by Cowper because it put on public display the diet of boarders at the school, a key section of the College which was closed twenty-four years ago In 1967. Still yet, he turned a blind eye to it. By the seventies, this cheer was not only considered old fashioned, but also a relic of the colonial and elitist era of the school. That a cheer initially considered vulgar could be thrown out the window as not being too "rootsy" enough some sixty years later was definitely a sign of the times. Now it seems that the pendulum is about to swing again, as just about every present day student wants to learn the cheer.

Old boys of Jamaica College also continue to form the cornerstone of Jamaican life, serving in just about every area of endeavor including politics in the major political parties. It was the former J.C. Head Boy of 1955 and now radio personality for many years, Neville Willoughby, who quipped at an Old Boys dinner held shortly before a General Election:

- "Fervet Opus in Campis
- When we shoot we never miss
- Governments come and Government go
- But J. C. boys still run the show ."

On the morning of April 18, 2007, Hartnel never woke up from his sleep. It was that morning that a desk and chair to the left of 4 Arts 11's classroom became unoccupied, and would remain so for the rest of the academic year. Hartnel suffered a heart attack after his distraught feelings when witnessing the shooting of a neighbourhood friend. At the time Hartnel told his family that he would rather die in his sleep than to die by the gun or the knife.

Indeed, inner-city community violence continues to claim the lives of our young people either directly or indirectly.

One thinks of the underlying meaning in Hartnel's name for we still hear the knell of his heart even now and we thank the Creator for the time he gave us with him. Hartnel is remembered for his kindness, jovial spirit, quiet demeanor, and his comedic "on-the-spot" songs which he chanted when teasing someone with certain attributes such as a big head, cast-eyes, smelly feet, and a host of other such "curses". Of course, he would have both the target of his ridicule and his spectators "cracking up" with laughter because of the lyrics.

Hartnel's smile is indelibly etched in our memory. So pleasant was this young man, that even when he was being

reprimanded by a teacher, he would smile.

Buried beneath the personality, perceptions and self-imposed limitations there lies a spirit of unlimited

possibilities. This was true of Hartnel for it was at the start of the Easter term that Hartnel made a commitment to settle down to serious academic work and made a cathartic journey to self-realization. His full potential was unfolding just before his life came to an abrupt end.

Jamaica College honours the memory of him and dedicates this page to a "true Blue blood" who is greatly missed and who will live on in our hearts forever.

THE JAMAICA COLLEGE STUDENTS COUNCIL REPORT

The Students' Council is a statutory body enacted by the Jamaican legislature in 1975 in an effort to give all students in Secondary Institutions a voice at the highest level of their schools, that is, the School Board of Directors. It is the standard that each and every student has rights, and where there is an infringement of that student's right, the onus falls on the Council to represent that student. Notwithstanding this, however, the Council's actions are based upon truth and it is this truth that enables the Council to effectively represent students.

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Prior to the new school year, the Council had gained entrance into the National Secondary Students' Council (NSSC) through Roshane O. Miller, National Vice President in charge of Public Relations, and St. Patrick Dunbar, Assistant to the National Treasurer; both participants at the Ministry of Education and Youth's Capacity Building Workshop 2006. The Council was dormant and through their involvement in this programme they have gained invaluable insight into the intricacies of the National Secondary Students' Council and have used these procedures to resuscitate the local council.

We got underway with our Annual General Elections in the first week of October. There were many vying for the presidency; however there could only be one winner. This came in the form of Demar Graham who thwarted his competitors by a slight margin; his nearest rival was Roshane O. Miller.

Our first task as a Council was to successfully host Region I's second Council meeting, in October 2006, which drew schools from the corporate area and Western St. Thomas. Truly this was a success as the region reports that we drew the most stu-

dents for the academic year 2006-7 to this meeting.

In November 2006 we visited the Golden Age Home in Vineyard Town where we made our contributions to our elders - as a tribute to those gone on before us; it was our only Community Relations Project. Special thanks to Sherwin Williams, Cable and Wireless Jamaica Ltd and, Herbert Hall, a member of the Jamaica College Old Boys Association.

There has been student representation on the School Board of Governors and the Schools' Community Board, by Demar Graham, on the School's Disciplinary Committee by St. Patrick Dunbar and the Personnel Committee of the School Board by both Councillors. Roshane O. Miller substituted on the Personnel Committee.

The Council was intimately involved in the Student Court where councillors defended students who felt they were wrongfully accused. The Council salutes Deron Williams (5th Form), Ramone Williamson (3B), Daniel Dixon (6A), and Jamie Allen (3rdForm) for their active participation in this initiative. The Council is actively involved in the formulation of the Peace Facilitators' Corps Constitution which we pledged to support and in the years to come, to participate in. Our aim is to partner with this organization in an attempt to curb crime and violence in school. Not as effective or efficient as we would have it. the Council often times faced difficulties in numerous areas. The major deficiency was the inability or lack of performance by both members of the Executive and the ordinary members. Our greatest areas of weakness were the perennial absenteeism of councillors at meetings, and problems associated with finance and planning, as well as community relations. The Council

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recognized that this was as a result of the inexperience of many executive members.

Finally, we have instituted a new process focused on promoting continuity. An interim executive was chosen under the leadership of David Nation (6B) in April in an effort to ensure student representation. We charge him and his executive to continue along the path of change in relations to sensitizing our students on the roles and responsibilities of the council and to fervently pursue effective representation in all spheres of student life.

We pray and anticipate prosperity in the years to come under the banner of our motto 'Responsible students make the difference'.

KEY CLUB REPORT

ey club is a co-educational service organization for high school students, organized and sponsored by The Kiwanis Club. It is a self-governing organization that elects its own officers, determines its own service activities, and establishes its own dues structure.

Its objectives include the obliectives of the Kiwanis. Once organized, a Key Club is continuously sponsored by a Kiwanis Club. Although the ultimate responsibility for Key Club sponsorship is that of the Kiwanis Board of Directors, sponsorship function is most directly carried out by the Kiwanis Clubs, assisted by a faculty advisor (who may or may not be a Kiwanian) designated by the high school administration.

events and other events took place. Projects included assisting visually impaired students with their homework and also with leisure time reading. Students were also assisted with the use of computers.

We were very active in inter-

he basketball season began afresh with a new coach and old boy, Kurt Stewart. The teams which represent the school in three leagues – the A-League (Under 19), B-League (Under 16) and the C-League (Under 14) – started their campaigns and programmes with less than one month in preparations entering the season.

The progress made by each team in contrast to their performance last year is noteworthy. In the preceding year the C-League lost all seven matches against their opponents in the first round of the competition, thus never advanced to the next stage. To our dismay the B-League team fell out of the contest in the first round, not as a result of performance but because of indiscipline, having played only three games, winning one and losing two. The A-League made an attempt to move to the next level but this proved to be difficult, as they lost six of their ten games.

The B-League squad, captained by Jermaine Patterson and vice –captained by Rory Adman, both with an average 12 pts/game, led a very young team with players from 1st and 2nd form (notably Deno Hibbert, 1C, MVP of the Primary League 2005-6). Congratulations to Cadeem Henry the lead rebounder with 10pts/game. The squad pressed forward to the quarter finals, having won four from six matches in the 1st round. Their hopes were squashed, nonetheless, as they departed the season losing two from three games.

Working diligently and creatively, and with a spirit of comradeship and loyalty to JC, the C-League squadron powered their way into the Semi-finals outperforming all in the 1st round, copping five from six games. The team, however, was stopped in their tracks by Ardenne High School, who narrowly defeated them 38-34. Thanks to Captain Alex Robinson (2E), lead scorer Deno Hibbert, averaging 14 pts/game, and lead rebounder Shaeed Crooks (2B) 12pts/ game. The team looks forward to the next season as they aim for the coveted position as the top performing team once more with the assistance of centre Andre 'Hammer' Phillips (2D) and point guard Ricardo Wilson (1A).

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~ The Students' Court of Jamaica College ~

The Jamaica College Students' Court of Justice sprang from a proposal submitted in February 2004 to the then Dean of Discipline, Mr. Andre Francis by Roshane O. Miller, a fourth form student. There was never a response to the proposal. A new proposal was submitted in the year 2007 by the same student through the office of the present Dean of Discipline, Rev. Anthony Eldemire.

Mr. Eldemire appointed the School's Resource Officer, Constable Spencer to evaluate the logistics of the endeavour and aid in the construction of a proposal to be submitted to the Principal, Mr. Ruel B. Reid.

The proposal was on the desk of the Principal in under a month; in his wisdom he recognized the great contribution which could be made by a group of this nature. Essentially it exposed the average student to the legal system and at the same time ensured that equity was upheld. Trained individuals would be able to adjudicate over matters, in consultation with the Dean's office and the Lawyer assigned to the group, Mrs. L. Patterson (Attorney-at-Law, University Lecturer and Sixth Form Law Teacher).

A meeting was held in the Dean's Chambers and the appointment of Court Officers were made: Roshane O. Miller, a top achiever in CAPE Law, a trained arbitra-

tor, leader, and peer counselor gained the position of Chief Justice, while St. Patrick Dunbar, a trained mediator as well as an outstanding CAPE Law student was made second judge. The School Captain, due to his capacity, was made the Director of Public Prosecution and the Students' Council President, also due to his position, was made Public Defender. The respective bodies were to work in the offices of their superiors; therefore the prefects carried out prosecution while the students councillors acted in the capacity of defense.

The Court must recognize those officials who aided during the year of formation. Mr. Rayon Douglas (6A), acted in the capacity of prosecutor for many of our sessions while the talents of Ramone Williamson (3B), Derron Williams (5th Form) and Jamie Allen (3rd Form) came to the fore as they defended the accused. Cases were referrals from the Deans

Office, Form Teachers and Prefects, who are essentially the police officers of the school.

The court established standard documentation in its infancy with the assistance of Daniel Dixon (6A). The system now has a summons notice as well as a standard arrest warrant. The program adjudicated with constant discourse with the office of the Dean of Discipline over approximately 30 matters over a period of three months; the court meets on a Monday, Wednesday and a Friday.

We must thank Constable Spencer for believing in this movement and dedicating his time to its development.

HE session began in September 2006 when school re-opened. It was a good start for the track team; approximately one hundred boys turned out for the team. The team was led by the former Olympian, Coach John Mair as the head coach. In this session we had fourteen development meets leading up to the Boys and Girls Athletic Championships. Our annual hosting of the Hugo Chambers road race took place in November 2006. This road race was for competitors of all age groups. The two events which were presented were the one mile for age thirteen and under and the ten mile for fourteen and up. We had some outstanding performances by teammembers. These were Romanie Edmond winning the one mile run and Bengallo Morrison finishing second in his age group in the 10 mile run.

The first track meet opening the session for 2007 was the Jamaica College Invitational. This development meet was hosted on the grounds of the school. Awards were presented to two members of the team, Andre Collins and Winston Barnes, for being the most disciplined athletes on the World Junior Team for Jamaica.

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The team participated in most of the track meets leading up to the Boys Championship. One major track meet was the Gibson Relay at the National Stadium. Jamaica College did fairly well, finishing third in the overall standing for boys.

In the following two weeks some of the team members participated in the Carifta Trials. This was a trial for the Jamaica Carifta Team. We had three members from the team making the side. The athletes were Kavean Smith, Waquar DaCosta making it for the under 17 and Andre Collins for the under 20. At the trials, there was an outstanding performance by Waquar DaCosta for being the only 13 year old to ever run 1.55.37 sec in the 800m. Going into the Boys Championship, it was looking good for the team and we knew we had the team to take home the Championship. On the first two days of champs, J.C was in a good position, leading up to the last day where we fell back into 3rd place and there we remained throughout the rest of the championship events. We put up a good fight but still not good enough to win the coveted title.

The team fell short in Champs because of being weak in class 2. This we hope to improve upon in the next session. Outside of all that, we had some outstanding performances by some of the athletes. One was Waquar DaCosta winning the double gold medal in the 400m and 800m for class 3. He set a new record

Three relay teams went the 4 by 100m, 4 by 400m and the 4 by 800m. Much was expected of these 3 teams. The 4 by 1 and 4 by 8 made the final except the 4 by 4. The 4 by 1 finished 5th and 4 by 8 finished 3rd in the finals.

THE PEACE FACILITATORS' CORPS IS A SOCIETY ENVISIONED AND FOUNDED BY ST. PATRICK DUNBAR IN SEPTEMBER OF 2005, AFTER SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETING FORTY (40) HOURS OF INTENSIVE TRAINING AND SIX MONTHS OF EXPERIENCE IN ANGER MANAGEMENT, CONFLICT RESOLUTION, MEDIATION, AND LEADERSHIP

DEVELOPMENT, WHICH ENDED IN MARCH OF 2006. THIS INITIATIVE WAS BORNE OUT OF THE NEED FOR STUDENTS TO DEAL WITH VARIOUS DEVELOPMENT ISSUES AS IT RELATES TO THE DAY-TO-DAY INTERVENTIONS AMONG PEERS, AND APPLYING THE APPROPRIATE RESPONSE MECHANISM WHEN THE NEED AROSE.

The main purpose and goals of the organization are to:

- i. Achieve change or empowerment in individuals through the Dispute Resolution Processes.
- ii. Provide Restorative Justice that ensures the appropriate response to deviance by addressing personal harm and responsibility, rather than focusing on blame and retribution.
- iii. Seek to facilitate healing for both victim and offender.
- iv. Shift from reacting to change to initiating change.
- v. Turn from negative reinforcement of bad behaviour to positive reinforcement of good behaviour.
- vi. Promote good morals and values which are essential to human development.
- vii.Educate the school populace on methods of self-control. Emphasizing self-awareness and self worth, by channeling emotions positively.

The Peace Corps is still in its infancy with a membership of thirteen (13), dialogue continues between stakeholders and potential affiliates in the development of the By-Laws.

Upon its completion a presentation of the drafted Constitution will be made available to the Principal for sanctioning.

The Corps is staffed by a Director and Mediator-in-Chief, St. Patrick Dunbar, Co-Director and Chief Peer Counsellor, Rayon Douglas

Arbitrator, Roshane O. Miller and Daniel Dixon. Sad to say our Staff Advisor, Mr. Kayson Jones, departed, leaving the Corps on its own for awhile. However, after approaching our new Counsellor, Mrs. J. Dunn, the society is poised for sustainable growth and development.

True Blue, the Peer Counselling society is an extension of the

Guidance Department, which operates in unison with the Peace Facilitators Corps. It was brought to fruition by Rayon Douglas in the latter period of the 2004 Academic year. The Society, still in its early stages, has managed to present appropriate documentation pertaining to its establishment to the Administration of the school. Since it inception members have been recruited and training sessions have been conducted through the help of organizations such as Youth Reaching Youth.

It has taken on several projects to aid the funding of its development the major being a Halloween social which was a first in Jamaica College True Blue continues to fulfill it mission statement which is to encourage positive morals and value in the school community throug peer to peer guidance, while educating students about the care opportunities available to them.


Overall the day was a success. Though there can only be one champion the attempts made by all houses ensured a day of enjoyment and entertainment.


HOUSE: COWPER HOUSE COLOUR: PURPLE




